Thomas W. Evenstad, under penalty of perjury, and based on personal knowledge except where indicated, certify that the following is true and accurate to the best of my ability.

- 1. I am a Legal Assistant at Jill Clark, P.A.
- 2. Following the September 24, 2009 hearing regarding Mr. Paul Stepnes' hard-drives ("the Hard-Drive issue"), Ms. Clark asked me to complete a project regarding those Hard-Drives. Using the Forensic Report disk, which I understand was prepared by Officer Hanson, I made sure I had printed hard-copies of all of the emails inside all of the following folders:

## **Converted Mbox messages**

- Noted Inbox Messages
- Noted Inbox Messages (from Jill Clark)
- Noted Sent Messages
- Noted Sent Messages (from Jill Clark)
- Noted E-mail messages

I went back to double-check that I had hard copies of all of the files inside the abovelisted folders.

- 3. I then reviewed the hard-copy printouts. I learned that some contained more than one email, and some contained only one email. Therefore, the total file count was different from the total email count.
- In reviewing these printouts, I assigned a unique number to each file (hard copy).
   I also assigned a unique number to each email.
- 5. I numbered each file on the hard copies, and I also numbered each of the emails. That meant that each hard-copy had 2 numbers on it, x, which represented the number in sequences of the files, and y, which represented the number in sequence of emails. I marked the hard copies with x/y. For example, if I was on file 15, but several of those files had contained multiple emails, the numbering might look like the following:

## 15/18

Which represents the  ${\bf 15}^{\rm th}$  file, and  ${\bf 18}$  total emails at this point.

- 6. I then created a chart of all emails, numbering them as noted above, and indicating the date, to and from, and a short re line. These included attorney-client emails, so I am not attaching the chart to this affidavit. I did, however, provide the chart to Ms. Clark for her analysis.
- 7. In particular, I was asked to determine where in the Forensic Report, emails to or from "Jill Clark" occurred. I made this analysis as I performed the work above. I also went back to check my work. Finally, I was asked by Ms. Clark to do a third audit.
- 8. My conclusion, based on the above-described review, and approximately 20 hours in performing this project, is that the emails that are "to" or "from" "Jill Clark" appear only in the following BOLDED converted email folders:
  - Noted Inbox Messages
  - Noted In Messages (from Jill Clark)
  - Noted Sent Messages
  - Noted Sent Messages (from Jill Clark)
  - Noted E-mail messages

To clarify the above, "to" and "from" means to Jill Clark (attorney) from Paul Stepnes (client) or vice versa. There are 2 emails from Stepnes to Clark in a different folder, but they were also copied to others, so I did not include them in my definition of "to" or "from" attorney and client.

I did locate 2 emails on which Ms. Clark was *copied*, or where someone else sent an email to Jill Clark (and for example, Mr. Stepnes was copied) that were in a different folder. But these were not "to" or "from" "Jill Clark" as defined above I brought these 2 emails where "Jill Clark" was *copied* to Attorney Clark's attention.

In conclusion, I did not locate any emails "to" or "from" Jill Clark/Paul Stepnes (except as noted above) in any folders except those that have (Jill Clark) to the right of the name (see page 1 of this Declaration).

This concludes my declaration of 4 pages.
